



## 1st Anniversary Child Dashboard

We were hopeful when we launched the Elkhart County Child Dashboard on September 29, 2021.

At every turn, the collaboration and resulting impact have exceeded our expectations. Gathering data to see trends has helped us act in new ways together. The dashboard has become a catalyst for action in big and small ways. When the average daily census rose to alarming levels in Elkhart County Juvenile Detention Center, a task force acted quickly to find solutions. There are dozens of other examples of how conversations and actions sparked by the Child Dashboard are helping us as a community to better reduce risks and support strengths of children and families.

We create change when we act. Having data on which to base our decisions helps us to more accurately target our actions and increases our effectiveness.

We are at the end of year one, but just beginning on our journey together with this powerful community tool to guide us. I am so grateful for the over 60 partners who have come together in this effort and the ways we are collaborating and taking action together. I am humbled and awed by all of you. Thank you so much for all you are doing for the children of Elkhart County.


## Accomplishments

The first year of the Elkhart County Child Dashboard has been one of remarkable growth. The Child Dashboard is changing how we help the youngest in our community.

Since launching in September 2021, we have nearly tripled our number of collaborating partners to 63 nonprofits, schools, and others working at child-related issues. Our dashboard includes 51 data points. The response to our mini grant process was incredible with 55 applications and 39 funded so far. We have dispersed over \$80,000 in mini grants, supported by the Community Foundation of Elkhart County, Robert Weed Corp, Bashor Children's Home, Oaklawn Foundation and The SOURCE.

The key to this community initiative is the work being done collaboratively by many partners. Community partners are sharing data, they are coming together to find solutions when data is trending in ways that put children at risk. More than 50 leaders attended each quarterly action meeting in the first year and brainstormed solutions, often finding immediate ways to take action.

Elkhart County has built a reputation for manufacturing goods for others, but now we're building a public health initiative that is drawing state and national attention.


